SAMU at Kodoji in November 2011 *Report by Tony and Gilly Coot*

You can generally expect to have some sort of adventure whenever you go to Gorricks Run and last weekend was no exception.

Gilly and I went up on Friday after picking up a load of timber to complete the lining of the kitchen and teacher's room. We got there at around 5pm, just in time to see a strange red dog on the track up to the zendo - it looked like a pup and we had a number of other sightings of this dog and another much darker one while we were there (this was reported to appropriate authorities).

Greg and Carl arrived about 20 minutes later together with Britta and Raph, who had decided that the creek was too deep for their Golf to safely navigate. What amazing timing - Greg and Carl had arrived just as they were about to turn back. Britta and Raph left their car next to the road on the flat before the creek crossing.

Next day work began in drizzling rain, which eventually eased off. Meanwhile, unbeknownst to us, an enormous volume of water was heading down the Macdonald River from the Hunter Valley. On Sunday morning we got a phone call from our neighbours from down at the river to say that a car belonging to one of our members was bogged on the road down to the crossing - It was Sue and Barry's car, which had stalled and become flooded. They were lucky to get out of it because the car's doors and windows had automatically locked when the water got into the engine. Luckily they were able to climb out through the rear door. Sue might expand in more detail about the retrieval of the car, the hospitality and care extended by our neighbours, Warwick and Jane Blacker, the write-off of the car and their eventual return to Sydney. She has photos of her waterlogged car too.



Following that phone call we all set off down to the river in Greg's car to see what we could see but were stopped by the creek crossing which was completely impassable even on foot - it was backed up from the river which, according to Warren Bailey, was at one point on Saturday night 3 metres over the crossing. It was still very high on Sunday morning. We could see the Golf on the other side of the river sitting in a lake of water about half-way up its wheels.

The end result of all this was that we stayed at Kodoji until Tuesday afternoon. When we

made it out the crossing was still running quite strongly (see photo). It was OK for Greg's car and our Outback but probably too strong for the Golf, which was damp but not damaged, so we left it there on slightly higher ground.

The good side of the flood was that we had two more working days of samu, and an enormous amount was achieved, including:

- Massive tree removal from behind the showers and toilets (thanks to Greg Carty's extraordinary swordsmanship in wielding the chain saw (and later the bow saw after he'd run out of chain oil) with amazing precision
- Cutting and stacking about two years supply of firewood (it needs to dry out for about 12 months before it can be split and used in the stoves)
- Completion of the plywood lining to the walls and ceiling of the kitchen extension and the partial completion of the cover strips and door and window architraves.
- Mowing a really good cleared area around the buildings
- Cleaning windows
- Repairing oryoki cloths, zafus and cushions
- Weeding and trimming rootstock growth from the extraordinarily flowering chestnut trees
- Cooking (fabulous food, which miraculously lasted right up until Tuesday) and washing up
- A trip to the swimming hole on Tuesday morning - there is a real need to clear a proper track between the creek crossing at the end of the road and the beginning of the track.

The rain also meant that the waterfall was roaring so, like the monks in the odd Korean movie, we were able to get in some traditional nude-waterfall-meditation practice.

The other good side of being stranded was meeting neighbours Ant and Sam Luck, from Boree Bills at the head of the valley (owned by Sam's mum, Eve Harmon), and new neighbour Nola who moved into Birdsford Cottage three weeks ago, with her two lovely donkeys Rosie and Jitterbug.

The Bureau of Meteorology has put the increased rainfall and flooding down to La Nina, which is currently in full swing and will continue for the whole of summer. Paradoxically, this wetness increases the fire danger.



A front page article in this morning's SMH states:

Record-breaking rains have created a perfect storm for the Rural Fire Service, which is facing dangerous grassland conditions not seen for 40 years. Just one hot, dry day will be enough to ignite vast spans of grassland across western and central NSW. Last night a grassfire sparked by a lightning strike at Jerilderie, in the southern Riverina district, was still burning.

"You've got to go back to the early '70s when we had the last big drought-breaking rains to find similar conditions in terms of the abundance and continuous nature of grassland," said the RFS commissioner, Shane Fitzsimmons, "That's the real challenge for us. Once grass grows and it dies off, it's tall, it's dead, it's very dry and it'll spread three times faster than a bushfire."

The zendo is now much better prepared for a fire. We may also consider having the paddock slashed later.

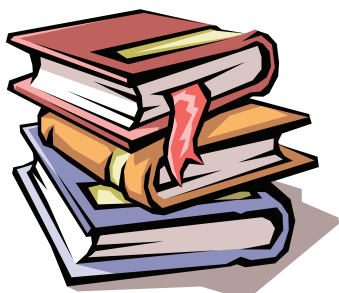
